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

# Third time's a charm for Starkville running back Jay Stevenson

Last season, senior Jay Stevenson was dominating Midsouth Association of Independent Schools defenses as Heritage Academy's featured running back.

Stevenson, a transfer from Eupora, where he spent his first two seasons, just couldn't be taken down by prep school defenses, but a crucial injury in the Pats' Class 5A playoff semifinal game against Oak Forest Academy (La.) forced him out of the game as Heritage was eliminated.

Despite a great year in Columbus, Stevenson took his talents to Starkville and the Yellow Jackets for his senior year.

Now at his third school in four years, the 6-foot-1-inch back is chasing the one thing he's failed to get in his high school career: a state championship.

"I wanted to get ready for the payt

"I wanted to get ready for the next level," Stevenson said. "Everything is faster here. There's better competition...I just have to step up and play hard, play my part. Those guys, I congratulated them on how they won their ring. I'm going to step up and try to get mine this year."

His arrival in Starkville was fortuitous, as his presence immediately fills a gap in the Jackets' ground game.

Last season, senior Curtis 'CJ' Willis moved over from defense to the backfield and ran for nearly 900 yards in 10 games, providing the offense a much-needed boost

Now, instead of finding a player to

change positions, they found the ideal replacement in Stevenson, a downhill runner with plenty of strength and speed to burn.

"He runs the ball well," head coach

Chris Jones said. "He blocks well. I think he's going to be great for us... We're going to play to his strengths, let him do what he does well."

Since transitioning to a new school

and a new program, Starkville has welcomed him with open arms, making the adjustment easier.

Eupora to Heritage Academy was a relatively easy transition as both schools have similar school enrollments despite the Patriots being in a bigger class in MAIS.

The move to Starkville was a challenge, however, considering both the size and scope – the school's enroll-

ment is more than double Heritage's and it now competes in MHSAA Class 7A.

"It's tougher, but I think I can adjust

to it and do work here," Stevenson said.
"...My coaches, my teammates, it's all love. It's been love from the jump."

Alongside Stevenson in the backfield will be Courtland Cooper, a duo Jones

called one of the best, if not the best, backfields in Mississippi.

The two will be splitting carries

during the season, keeping them stronger and fresher as the season wears on.
"Truthfully, Courtland can go any-

where and start," Jones said. "Jay can go anywhere and start, but they're going to share time. For them to be unselfish about it I think is going to make each one of them better."

Stevenson credits former Heritage

head coach Lance Pogue for providing him guidance he still relies on – being mentally strong, staying even-keeled and persevering through rough patches.

With the jump in competition this

season, some rough patches are to be expected early on, but with a robust resume of success wherever he's gone, Stevenson is looking to end his high school career with a bang.

"I'm feeling great," Stevenson said.
"I think this is the year. This is the year they're going to size me up."

# West Point's Kahnen Daniels is ready to end his high school career with a state title

Walking off the turf at M.M. Roberts Stadium in Hattiesburg last December, West Point quarterback/running back Kahnen Daniels was unsatisfied.

After four-straight state championships from 2016-19, the Green Wave fell just short for the third-straight season in a 31-21 loss to Picayune. For Daniels, it was his sec-

ond-straight season experiencing such a crushing loss, but that didn't stop the four-star prospect from getting back in the gym for this season.

"I always set the standard for my-

self," Daniels said. "I always aim high,

but it's still the same goal. I'm trying to be able to get a state championship under my belt...It did set a fire in us. I feel like it's driven us more and more to go at it one more time with the guys."

With the offseason came growing

anticipation on where the budding superstar would continue his football career at the next level.

He had quite the resume to back

up that anticipation, rushing for more than 2,000 yards and 24 touchdowns in his junior season alone. In his West Point career, Daniels has amassed over 3,000 rushing yards and 32 rushing touchdowns.

He finally made his decision known

in April, verbally committing to South-

eastern Conference powerhouse Florida, a program that has made him feel at home despite his being a year away from stepping in Gainesville as a student.

"They basically treat me like their own already," Daniels said. "They're

excited for me to be on campus. I'm excited to get on campus. I'm just waiting on that time."

His focus lately has been solely on West Point, and his decision in April was a calculated one, finishing up with

Daniels is excited to get his senior year underway and have it end with hardware in his hands.

"I feel like we'll be able to go out victorious if we just stick together and just keep punching," Daniels said. "...I'm very excited to see what we can do all together...I showed a glimpse last year, but I'm really going to turn it up this year and leave it all out on the field."

# New Hope revamped and ready to go after a disappointing 2022 campaign

Trojans hope young roster propels them to first winning season since 2016

The 2022 season was one of highs and lows for the New Hope Trojans, starting out with a near-perfect script.

A comeback win to open the season at home against rival Caledonia sent the Trojan faithful into a frenzy, but for as incredible a start as New Hope saw, the end was rough.

The Trojans lost six of their last eight games, missing out on the Mississippi High School Activities Association Class 5A playoffs with a 4-6 re-

As the calendar has turned to the 2023 season, there's newfound confidence and optimism throughout the program, and that starts at the top with third-year head coach Seth Stillman.

"We're really excited," Stillman said. "It's going to be a young football team for us, but these guys get after it. I think we have a chance to be

season. Starting quarterback Hayden Dodson had an injury-riddled 2022, which was tough to maneuver for the offense, but in his place, among other options, stepped up fresh-

man Matthew Benge. Now a sophomore with plenty of varsity game experience under his belt, Stillman is entrusting him to lead the offense, one that scored just 15.8 points a game last sea-

"We're fortunate enough that Matthew filled in last year when Hayden was injured," Stillman said. "He got a ton of invaluable experience. With him being so young and freshman Juice Tate taking reps, we probably won't make a decision for another few weeks on who will be out

Up front, New Hope will have a revamped offensive line led by junior

Lonnie Shinn, the 6-5 tackle who has been putting in work this offseason to put on some muscle and become a more agile blocker.

"I've always been one of the bigger pieces to the team, but moving forward, I've worked to be a better leader, motivating guys harder," Shinn said. "Me starting as a freshman and knowing the young guys we have, I just try to coach them up to build that confidence."

The Trojans will roster roughly a dozen seniors in 2023, less than half the total number of seniors as last season, so the onus is on the junior class to step up.

Defensively, that player is Junior Baskin, a linebacker who missed last season entirely with an ACL injury. Back close to 100 percent as preseason practices continue, Baskin is feeling better than ever with a point to prove as a junior.

"I went through about five months of rehab," Baskin said. "It was really tough watching my team go out and play and not really being able to help as much, but knowing that me getting myself right would help as much as I could was the motivation for me."

The Trojans are set to begin the season Aug. 25 against a familiar foe in Itawamba Agricultural, a program they lost 34-7 to last season.

With the page fully turned to 2023, New Hope is ready to flip the script and secure its first winning season since

2016. "There is no down week in our non-conference schedule, so we're going to be tested early," Stillman said. "I think that's going to help us come district play...We're going to go out and do our best to compete every week. Our goal is to make the playoffs."

# Kelly's Cavaliers to continue program's upward trajectory

Late-season push has young Caledonia team aiming for fast start

Upon entrance to the Caledonia football fieldhouse, the first thing in sight is a massive sign with a simple message: "Beat New Hope."

While the Cavaliers

have lost five straight to the Trojans, Caledonia has produced some of the best, and more importantly, consistent, football in their history since head coach Michael Kelly took over in 2018. In 2021, the Trojans

finished with an 8-1 regular season record and advanced to the North Half championship game, losing a heartbreaker to Senatobia 34-27.

Last season the Cavaliers rallied back from a 1-5 start to clinch a playoff spot, beating New Albany and Clarksdale before losing to eventual 4A state champions Louisville in the third round. It was a difficult road back to the playoffs, but the team demonstrated tremendous fortitude and focus in the process. Kelly has worked hard to make that a part of his program's culture, and it will be important in 2023 as they look to several

young starters to step up. "We pride ourselves on playing fundamentally sound defense and to do that you have to be sound reading gaps and making tackles," Kelly said.

"Our coaching staff does a great job teaching and drilling the fundamentals, and that's part of our culture. The details matter, and that's what we're working on this time of year. Don't beat yourself."

The seniors in the team this year are eager to make another trip to the postseason, but while they carry their past achievements with pride they remain focused on the task at hand. That means being their own team, making their own

"I know everyone wants to talk about the 2021 team that made it to North Half, everybody wants to compare us to that," senior offensive lineman Judd Shelton said. "But I think right now we have players who can match the speed, stamina, and pure physicality of that team, and if we can get this right we can get right back to where we were. We only go as far as we take our-

selves." The Cavaliers will find a way to run the ball. Their offense utilizes

players at every skill position to manipulate the opposing defense with motion and set up blocking schemes to create gaps. It's a grind from start to finish, cemented by hours of work in practice memorizing reads and rehearsing plays.

Senior linebacker Shep Donald, someone who has started on defense every year of his high school career, sees iust that from his offense, and the Cavaliers defense is better for it.

"It certainly helps us on defense, up front or at defensive back to go against them each day," Donald said after a round of drills calling out plays and reading blocks. think here we have some of the most talented skill players we've had, so with everybody shifting, and we've seen some crazy stuff on offense, it really helps us out playing against that every day."

The standards are high for the Cavaliers, which is a credit to the program's success over the last few seasons. Even with the number of sophomores coming into



I say that with great confidence," Kelly said of his young team. "That's just a result of the culture we've built through junior high and our peewee system. A lot of these young men started in that system, but there's a difference between knowing and executing on Fridays. Now we've got to give them the confidence to do it."

Caledonia's first game is an away trip to Nettleton on Aug. 25. They'll look to start as they mean to go on, and for several starters it is the last ride they will go on as Cavaliers. The goal is the same as always, though, to end the season

winning a championship. "I know it's the last ride, but we've talked about how we want to leave a legacy here," Shelton said ahead of his senior season. "So it hasn't really hit me yet, and I don't want it to until it's that state championship game on December 1. I'll let it hit me then."

# **Chemistry the** key to success for Columbus Christian

Football is back at Co-

lumbus Christian Acade-Jeremy Brock served as head coach for the

2022 season but left the program ahead of this summer. CCA once again had to fill the position, but quickly identified and brought in Chris Craven, an experienced MAIS coach formerly of Oak Hill Academy and most recently at Starkville Academy. He is the alltime winningest coach in Raiders history, and will hope to make a similar impact in his time with the Rams.

"They inquired with me. I was happy at Starkville Academy but I prayed about it and it felt like something I was supposed to do," Craven said of taking the job.

Craven takes over a Rams team that went 5-6 in 2022, losing in the first round of the playoffs to Prentiss Academy in a 58-42 shootout. The current team of

mostly underclassmen stands at 18 players total with only three seniors. The rest of the team are freshman or sophomores, which means there may be some mismatches physically against other schools, but it also means the program is ripe for shaping how Craven sees fit.

"When you start out with a younger team you're able to build the program in your vision



# The feat to repeat: Starkville football looks for state title No. 8

STARKVILLE - The scene in Hattiesburg last December was one Starkville High School football will never forget.

A six-year state championship drought ended as the Yellow Jackets became the first No. 4 seed to win a Mississippi High School Activities Association Class 6A state title, going from 0-3 in district play to a season-ending eightgame winning streak.

Starkville reached the summit of Mississippi high school football in 2022, but the pressure is already on for the program to repeat in 2023.

Under a new classification, the Jackets look to etch their name as the first 7A school to take home hardware in 2023.

"At the end of the day, it's a completely new season with a new set of challenges," head coach Chris Jones said. "We can't reminisce too much about the past seasons. It's all about this season, getting better and making sure that we're better than we were last year."

It was a perfect storm of success last season, a well-oiled machine of an offense combined with a stout defense.

Scattered about were a number of Division I prospects, especially amongst the senior class, but a number of those prospects return this season.

Back again is starting quarterback Trey Petty, one of the most electric du-



# Tigers ready to pounce on sixth state championship

**Noxubee County** focusing on finishing after title game defeat

MACON – Simply put, last season's Mississippi High School Activities Association Class 3A state title game between Noxubee County and Raleigh was the game of the season in the state.

Ole Miss commit and four-star standout Suntarine Perkins shined for Raleigh, running for more than 300 yards and four touchdowns, but the Tigers never quit.

Behind quarterback Kamario Taylor and wide receiver Anthony Little Jr., Noxubee County held its own and then some, but a few too many mistakes cost them in an eventual 55-52 loss.

That loss has stuck with Noxubee County since last December and has made the Tigers hungrier than ever to add a sixth state title since 2002 to their trophy case.

"Everything has been building off of that game," head coach Teddy Young said. "The biggest thing that we've been preaching is finishing: learning how to finish quarters, learning how to finish every play, every drive."

Taylor put himself on the map in Hattiesburg during that game, throwing for five touchdowns and subsequently receiving an offer from South-

58-21 win.

ern Miss later that night.

An injury sidelined the junior for two months last season, but that didn't stop him from putting the program on his back on the way to a state title game.

Knowing that teams are now looking more closely than ever at the prospect 6-foot-5-inch has provided that extra motivation to show out.

"It's inspiring knowing that folks are coming out to watch me play, but also coming out to watch my teammates," Taylor said. "We're bringing all of the eyes out here, so people have the chance to see someone else ball out there too."

This season, however, is not a showcase for college scouts; it's a revenge tour for the Tigers, who were one bad pass away from a potential state championship.

It's been the driving force of motivation throughout the offseason into the preseason, and a point of emphasis in whatever this team does.

"That's the culture here," Young said. "We always preach, 'State championship,' but to be that close, that's been our motivation. It's lit a fire under us."

While Little Jr. graduated in May, there is plenty of firepower returning offensively.

Running backs Martavius Wicks and Ledareoun Mosley will once again head up the backfield alongside Taylor, and wide receivers Jaylen King, Jadquist Clark and Dequadrion Welch return

"We're returning a lot of starters," Taylor said. "We're getting on the younger guys, making them grind harder in practice, in the weight room. We don't want to go back and lose. It means something to everyone...I'm pretty sure when we go back this year, we're not going to lose."

A daunting non-district schedule awaits Noxubee County, facing teams like West Point. Starkville, Louisville and Itawamba Agricultural, but once district play comes around, those games will only make the Tigers stronger in bigger moments.

"This is a new season, new year, new team," Young said. "We're just excited to see what this year brings.'


